County community!



Thank you Fall Environmental Camps!!



If you enjoyed environmental camp, consider joining us for 4-H camp July 2-5th. More information to come!









4-H provides youth numerous opportunities to learn, grow and become productive adults. As a result, 4-H is a perfect place for young people to start exploring potential careers.


From robotics to cooking, 4-H's many programs, clubs and activities have something to interest every young person. If youth have an interest, talent or hobby, chances are they can learn more about it or do something productive with it in 4-H. As they learn more and do more in a particular interest area, a young person may develop a passion for a particular activity, eventually leading to a career in that field. 4-H provides a safe environment for exploration before young people choose a college major or commit to a particular career.

Through 4-H, members can explore many of their interests under the guidance of a caring adult volunteer. These volunteers are often experts in the topics they teach, help educate youth and show the many career possibilities available in a particular field. Volunteers also provide valuable networking experiences as youth begin thinking about careers.

Conservation Writing and Jim Claypool Art Contest I RULES

STATE WINNERS:

First: \$250; Second: \$150; Third: \$50 REGIONAL WINNERS: \$50

COUNTY LEVEL WINNERS: \$25

* State/Regional winners will receive a personalized certificate. County winners that win regional or state awards will only receive one check for the top prize.

RULES

- Kentucky students grades 6-12 are eligible to compete in the writing contest. Students up to grade 5 may compete in the art contest.
- 2. A student may not enter both the art contest and the writing contest during the same contest.
- An entry must be created by one and only one student. Any entry submitted by more than one student will be disqualified.
- All entries become the property of the contest sponsors. The decisions of the judges at all levels of competition are final.
- Top three writing entries and/or artworks from your school must be submitted to your local county conservation district by Dec. 1, 2023.
- 6. ARTWORK: Student entries shall be 8 ½" X 11". Entries may be digital or submitted on any color or thickness of art board (poster board, mat board, etc.) or may be on art paper, which is firmly affixed to art board. All artwork must be two-dimensional (2-D). Three-dimensional (3-D) artwork will not be accepted. Artwork may be rendered in any medium: pencil, ink, charcoal, pastel, crayon, paint, photography, etc. Mixed media and collage work is acceptable as long as all pieces are securely glued to the surface of the work. All entries must convey at a glance an accurate understanding of the information provided in the tabloid, the theme of the competition, and persuade the viewers of the need for good wildlife conservation practices. All entries must be the original work of the student.
- 7. WRITING: Entry may not exceed 1,000 words and must be written in ink or typed on one side of paper only. No photographs or artwork may be included with the written work. The written entry should demonstrate an accurate understanding of the information provided in the tabloid and inform the reader about wildlife conservation. Students should write from the perspective of an informed writer to a less informed reader and may be in the form of a letter, article, editorial or speech. The work should be from the student author and avoid plagiarism from this source or other sources. ALL sources should be reputable and cited appropriately.
- 8. The entry form to the right must be completed and attached to your entry.

HELPFUL HINTS

- · Keep entry simple and sincere.
- Be creative and original. Avoid plagiarism by using original words and ideas. Plagiarism is defined as the act of stealing and passing off the words of another as your own without crediting the source.
- Consider an area of wildlife conservation that is important to you, your family and your community.
- · Draw from your personal interests or experiences.
- · Writing entry should take the form of informational.
- Think about wildlife issues in your community, farm, subdivision or city.
- DO NOT use this tabloid as your only source.
- Interview people in your community about changes in wildlife issues
 Find ways to improve wildlife issues in your community. TAKE ACTION!


POINT SYSTEM FOR ART

- 50 points Purpose/Audience. (Appropriate communication style to reach audience, establishes and maintains a purpose; and holds to subject in community. Theme clearly conveyed at a glance.)
- 30 points Composition/creativity/craftsmanship. (Layout, originality, and quality of work, such as neatness.)
- 20 points Language/correctness. (Word choice, usage, spelling, punctuation, capitalization.)

POINT SYSTEM FOR WRITING

- 30 points: Purpose/Audience (establishes and maintains a purpose, communicates with audience, employs a suitable tone)
- 20 points: Organization (logical order, coherence, transition organizational signals)
- 20 points: Idea Development/Support and Evidence of Research (student's original work shows sources of research)
- 30 points: Correctness (spelling, punctuation, capitalization),
 Language (word choice, usage), Sentences (varied in structure and length, constructed effectively, complete and correct)

THIS MONTH'S TOPIC:

AN ATTITUDE OF GRATITUDE

You may have heard before that it is important to be grateful for something. You might have wondered what that means or why it matters.

Gratitude is when you feel thankful for the good things in your life. This could be the things people often take for granted, like having food, clean water, a place to live, friends, and family. Gratitude is taking time to think about how lucky you are when something good happens, big or small. Gratitude is telling others when they have a part in those things.

Gratitude can start by thinking about the things in our life that we love: special people, places, and things. For example, you may love your grandparents, your neighborhood playground, or your favorite toy or game. When we show gratitude for things we love, we show that we appreciate

the time, effort, or resource that someone has put into us getting to experience those things. We show gratitude for our grandparents when we thank them for spending time with us. We show gratitude for our playground when we pick up trash around it and thank our parents for taking us there to play. We show gratitude for our favorite toys by thanking the people who gave them to us or gave us the opportunity to get them.

It is important to be grateful and show it to others. Being grateful feels good and is good for you. Making it a habit to have an attitude of gratitude can:

- Make it easier to learn and make smart decisions.
- Help you feel happier and less stressed by focusing on what you have, instead of what you don't.
- Lead to caring actions. When you are grateful for someone's kindness, you are more likely to be nice in return.
- Help you build better relationships. When you feel and express gratitude and respect to people in your life, it creates loving bonds. It also builds trust and helps you feel closer.





When you make gratitude a regular part of your life, you become more aware of good things as they happen. Sometimes feelings of gratitude happen on their own. You can also make them by looking for things around you that you appreciate. Each day, pay attention to things that make you happy, and that you are glad to have in your life.

Try to think of one of each of these things every day: a person you love, a place you are happy to be, and something you are glad that you have.

You might not always feel positive or want to practice gratitude, but if you're feeling down, that is exactly the right time to be grateful and feel the effects.

Corn and Sweet Potato Confetti Salad

3 cups sweet potato, peeled and diced

3½ cups cut fresh corn kernels (7 ears) or frozen corn kernels **2** green bell peppers, diced

1 red bell pepper, diced

1 small red onion, diced

1 tablespoon olive oil

½ cup cider vinegar

1/2 teaspoon salt

Bring one cup of water to boil in a 2 quart saucepan; **add** diced sweet potatoes. **Cook** sweet potatoes 10 minutes or until slightly tender. **Drain** and set aside. **Remove** shuck and silk from fresh corn ears; **cut** kernels from cob. **Dice** peppers and red onion. **Heat** olive oil in a large skillet on medium setting; **add** sweet potatoes and **cook** until slightly browned. **Add** peppers; **cook** 5 minutes; **add** corn kernels.

cooking until tender. **Combine** red onion and cider vinegar in large bowl; **add** skillet vegetables; **toss** and salt to taste. **Serve** warm or refrigerate for chilled version.

Yield: 16, 1/2 cup servings

Nutritional Analysis: 70 calories, 1.5 g fat, 0 g saturated fat, 0 mg cholesterol, 95 mg sodium, 13 g carbohydrate, 2 g fiber, 4 g sugars, 2 g protein.
