MINUTES OF THE FEBRUARY 28, 2023 GUILD MEETING

The meeting was brought to order at 6:30 p.m. by President Mary Ann Burch and guests were welcomed. Members with February birthdays were reminded to choose a birthday fat quarter, and Mary Ann reminded us to visit the "free table" for items being shared.

The first order of business was to vote on the amendment to our by-laws which had been presented in writing at our January meeting and noted in the February newsletter. The amendment is to add to ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP AND DUES a new section as follows:

<u>Section 5.</u> The Guild belongs to the Franklin County Homemakers as a Special Interest Homemakers group. Annual dues for the Franklin County Homemakers shall be paid when due for each Guild member out of general funds held by the guild.

Sheri Bochantin moved and Debi Newman seconded that the proposed amendment be adopted. The motion passed unanimously.

Treasurer Debi Newman reported a total balance of \$7,621.14, with \$4,621.00 designated for Christmas stockings. Efforts to change banks and to invest some of the money in short term certificates of deposit are ongoing but not finalized.

Committee reports

Membership – Debra Miller reported that we now have 56 members in good standing. She has been updating the membership directory as new members join.

Quilts of Valor – Debbie Brown reported that the next meeting will be Tuesday, March 14 in room G at the Extension Office from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Debi Newman will do a presentation at 10 a.m. on constructing a floating star block. The National QOV Sewing Day on February 4 was a big success.

Charity Quilts – Debbie Poole reported that CKHQG had received a very sizeable donation through KHQS of fabrics, completed quilt tops, and partially completed quilt tops which originated with a quilter in Lagrange who had died. The material has been sorted through and the items which are nearest to finished were "kitted up" for members to help toward completion and donation. A motion was made that we send a gift in the amount of \$200 to KHQS in appreciation of their contribution in aid of our charitable efforts. The motion carried. There will be a Beads of Courage sew day on March 25 from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Hospice Charity Quilts – Sheri Bochantin reported that she has made a connection with our local Hospice so that the Hospice quilts we make will be distributed to local patients.

Franklin County Fair – Mary Quinan. The fair is scheduled for July 18-22.

Homemakers Christmas Store – Leah Tupts. Pam Penn has given us a lot of fleece to add to the puppet making supplies donated by Marilyn Davis. Christmas in July sew days are scheduled for July 28 and 29 to work on items for the Homemakers Holiday Store (as well as Christmas stockings).

Set in a unique Medallion-style arrangement, this quilt contains over 70 individual block patterns. Smart Homes
Bring your home into the 21st century by adding useful tech around the house. Learn about all sorts of home
tech, from security systems and doorbell cameras to digital thermostats and door locks you can control from your smart phone.
Savor the Flavor: Cooking with Oils and Vinegars
Many of us know there are a variety of cooking oils and flavored vinegars out there, but may not be sure how
and when to use them. Join us for this class in which you will learn about adding flavor to foods and dishes
with cooking oils and vinegars. We will learn about some of the most common types of cooking oils and flavored vinegars found in your grocery store — or they may be already in your cupboard!
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Cast Iron Cooking Outdoors (and indoors)
